Encouraging adults and young adults to write creatively are new activities at the Dunklin County Library. A main goal of the two writing projects is an enriching and extremely fun experience at the library.

Bootheel Writers is an adult creative writing group held twice monthly at the Kennett headquarters of the Dunklin County Library. This writing group has dynamic leadership to provide suggestions, publication hints,

and encouragement. Carol Fisher and John Fisher, both published authors, navigate writers through exercises and conversation to inspire the creative product to print. Through the previous weeks, participants have written poems, personal memoirs, and historical details.

The Write Club is a 9-week teen creative writing group

that will be held every other week in Kennett. This group begins on Tuesday, April 8, 2025 at 4 pm. Encouraging young people to write and use various techniques, Library Assistant Director Julie Orf will guide exercises through detailed processes, games, and activities for a written product. Area teachers are welcome to share this workshop information with their students and to assist in the activities. Most importantly, young writers hopefully will have a



memorable experience and continue the writing process after the program concludes.

Ennis Book Discussion on April Evening!

The April date for the Ennis Book Discussion will be held on Tuesday, April 29, 2025 at 7 pm. This month's book is The Secret Book of Flora Lea by Patti Callahan Henri.

In the war-torn London of 1939, fourteen-year -old Hazel and five-year-old Flora are evacuated to a rural village to escape the horrors of the Second World War. Living with the kind Bridie Aberdeen and her teenage son, Harry, in a charming stone cottage along the River Thames, Hazel fills their days with walks, stories, and games to distract her young sister. One story is for her sister alone about a magical land.

The unthinkable happens when young Flora suddenly vanishes while playing near the banks of the river. Hazel blames herself for her sister's disappearance, and she carries that guilt into adulthood as a private burden she feels she deserves.

Twenty years later, Hazel is in London, ready to move on from her job at a cozy rare bookstore to a career at Sotheby's. Her tidy

life is turned upside down when she unwraps a package containing an illustrated book called Whisperwood and the River of Stars. Hazel never told a soul about the imaginary world she created just for Flora. Could this book hold the secrets to Flora's disappearance? Could it be a sign that her beloved sister is still alive after all these years?

Published in 1923, Whose Body? By Dorothy L. Sayers stands the test of time as a thrilling mystery. Lord Peter Wimsey, a traumatized war veteran turned amateur detective, investigates the mysterious death of a body found after a financier's

disappearance. He suspects a deeper conspiracy involving prominent citizens. Teaming up with Inspector Charles Parker, he unravels a complex DOROTHY L.SAYER murder plot.



C.S. Lewis's The Screwtape Letters uses a series of letters from a senior demon to his

nephew to explore human nature. Through this devilish perspective, the book offers a witty look at Screwtape the subtle ways humans are tempted.
