## **Quilts at the Dunklin County Library**

Get ready for a vibrant display of color and local talent at the Dunklin County Library this September! Starting on Saturday, September 6, 2025, the library headquarters will host an

exhibition of beautiful quilts created by local artists.

As soon as you walk in, your eyes will be drawn to the quilts hanging from the second-floor balcony and over the

windows. One special quilt, created by Bertha Rooney Blanchard, honors the workers of the Ely Walker Factory and hangs near the entrance. Another, made by the Ladies Club of Hornersville, celebrates the 150th Anniversary of the U.S. Constitution with patriotic colors.

Many local quilters have contributed their works of art, including Bill Hook, Wilma Chilton, Cathy Bradford, Virginia Smith, Jeannie Brown, Elaine Pfeffer and others. Each quilt is a masterpiece, from the careful selection of fabric to the intricate

stitching, and many have a unique story behind their design.

The quilt was originally a strictly utilitarian article,

born of the necessity of providing warm covers for beds, doorways, and windows. The earliest American quilts were so intimately connected to everyday life of the early colonists that no record of them exists.

Some quilters follow the craft in conventional form for leisure-time

amusement or because it represents a tradition they find emotionally significant. Others have found in quilting an artistic medium they can manipulate to their ends, and have ultimately created new styles and techniques. One warning: quilting is addictive.

While you are at the library, be sure to visit the Hall of Honor on the second floor. This area is dedicated to celebrating individuals who have made significant contributions to Dunklin County.




#### Delta Fair Fun in September

### **Library Super Fans**

After his death in July, Dan Pelzer's family discovered a handwritten list of 3,599 books he had read. His family created a website with scans of the list—over 100 pages long.

The website went viral, and the Columbus Metropolitan Library's Whitehill branch, where Mr. Pelzer was a devoted patron, took notice. The library transformed the list into a searchable PDF on their site and created displays featuring some of his favorite books. Mr. Pelzer borrowed most of his books from this Ohio branch.

Dan Pelzer's son, John, said his father was a voracious reader who vowed to finish every book he started. While the list spans many genres, Dan had a particular fondness for mysteries, especially books by authors like Sue Grafton and Robert Ludlum.

Dan began keeping the list in 1962 while he was in the Peace Corps in Nepal. However, his family did not discover the detailed record of his reading until the early 2000s when they saw him writing in it.

Dan Pelzer's final entry, *David Copperfield* by Charles Dickens, was dated December 30, 2023. His son, John, noted that Dan began losing his eyesight that year and had to stop reading, but his love for books and the library remained. John recalled that his father would "recoil" at the idea of being given a book as a gift, telling him, "John, I can get that from the library."

The Dunklin County Library is very much like the Whitehall Library because super library users exist here as well. Several of the super library user reading history has 1500 or more books, and that number may even be higher due to the current computer record system began in 2007. The library used a previous computer system, and library cards with copper plates were used for hand checking out books before computers.

Most super library users vary in their reading genres from mysteries to fantasy to non-fiction to romance. They also listen to audiobooks, read ebooks, and read actual books. Some readers note the love of holding and smelling a book. And, usually, for a true book lover, reading is preferred to television. Everyone can benefit from a break from phones, screens, and internet!

If you enjoy reading, set your own pace. Reading is not a race! Read the books, the newspaper, the magazines, the online articles, and such that fill your needs. Be like Dan Pelzer and get your books from your local library! Your Dunklin County Library also offers the Libby app for ebooks, audiobooks, magazines, and more with a library account.
